
Saxon brooch designs painted too, using patterns and images that were used on the authentic brooches during Anglo

St Mawes Primary School - SAILING

We are thrilled to let you know that we are able to offer free sailing lessons as an after-school Sailing Club (SMSC). These weekly lessons start on Thursday April22nd.

Youngsters have to be 8 or older, hopefully confident in the water and be keen to give it a go! We hope that your children will really enjoy the experience and gain a lot from it. To ensure that they enjoy their time on the water it is important they are properly equipped. SMSC supplies buoyancy aids for the group and although we hope to have limited supply of wetsuits, we would appreciate it if children could bring their own if they have one. SMSC do not supply footwear and they must have something to go on their feet as the stones and shells can be really sharp. A hat and wind-top are also useful.

It is important that the children change before arriving as this will give them more time on the water. The dinghy sailing starts from Stoneworks Quarry, which is accessed on via a small lane on Tredehnam Road. It is a beautiful spot but the changing facilities are limited so anything that can be done to help would be appreciated. There are toilets on the Quay.

SMSC run their sail training in Pico or Hartley dinghies usually with two pupils per boat and the instructor in close proximity in the rescue boat. They always run through drills ashore before going afloat to practice the skills. Although there is not guarantee that the boats wont capsize during the sessions, every care is taken to try and ensure that they don't and if they do it often becomes a popular activity. Nonetheless we would appreciate being told about pupils who are nervous, weak or non swimmers. There is sometimes the opportunity to take pupil's in a larger dinghy with an Instructor on board.
